General Assembly (GA)

We started the GA with three Omkars followed by the Shanti Mantra. A couple of students came on stage and narrated a discussion they had in class regarding getting control over your mind, by, for example depriving yourselves of technology for entertainment for one day. This led to the story that was discussed a couple of weeks ago regarding the king and his bodyguard.

A king had a bodyguard who took very good care of him, so the king decided to reward him by telling him they could switch places for one day. There are many things that could have happened - bodyguard could have killed the king, the bodyguard could have been killed because the king was not a good bodyguard, the bodyguard could have had the king imprisoned etc.. What really happened was that the bodyguard got the king killed and there was chaos in the kingdom. The bodyguard is the "mind" and the king is "you". If you have control over the mind and tell it what to do, then there will be peace and happiness. The moment your mind starts controlling you, you lose control of your life, your ego takes control.

This led to another analogy - of a car and driver. The car is equivalent to the "mind". "You", the driver tell the car where to go, when to stop. If the car crashes, it is the fault of the driver - not the car. The car is just a "servant", and you the "master" need to tell it where to go. Just imagine what would happen if the car takes control of you. "You" are supposed to use the "mind" and tell it what to do, not the other way around.

Then we went back to the start of the discussion about depriving ourselves of technology for one day. By doing that, you are telling your mind that you are in control. If you start playing video games and can't seem to let go, it means the "servant" (your mind) has become your master. It could also be something as simple as sitting still doing meditation, which is not easy for a lot of people. If you tell your mind that you will not move during meditation, you will succeed. Remember, your mind is your servant and you need to tell it what to do. If you develop this kind of control over your mind, you will very peaceful.
